Buildings are coloured black and important building uses (such as hospitals, post offices, factories etc.) are numbered, with a numbered key describing their use.

They were produced by the Russians for the benefit of navigation, as well as strategic military sites and transport hubs, for use if they were to have invaded the U.K. The detailed information provided indicates that the areas were surveyed using land-based personnel, on the ground, in the cities that are mapped.

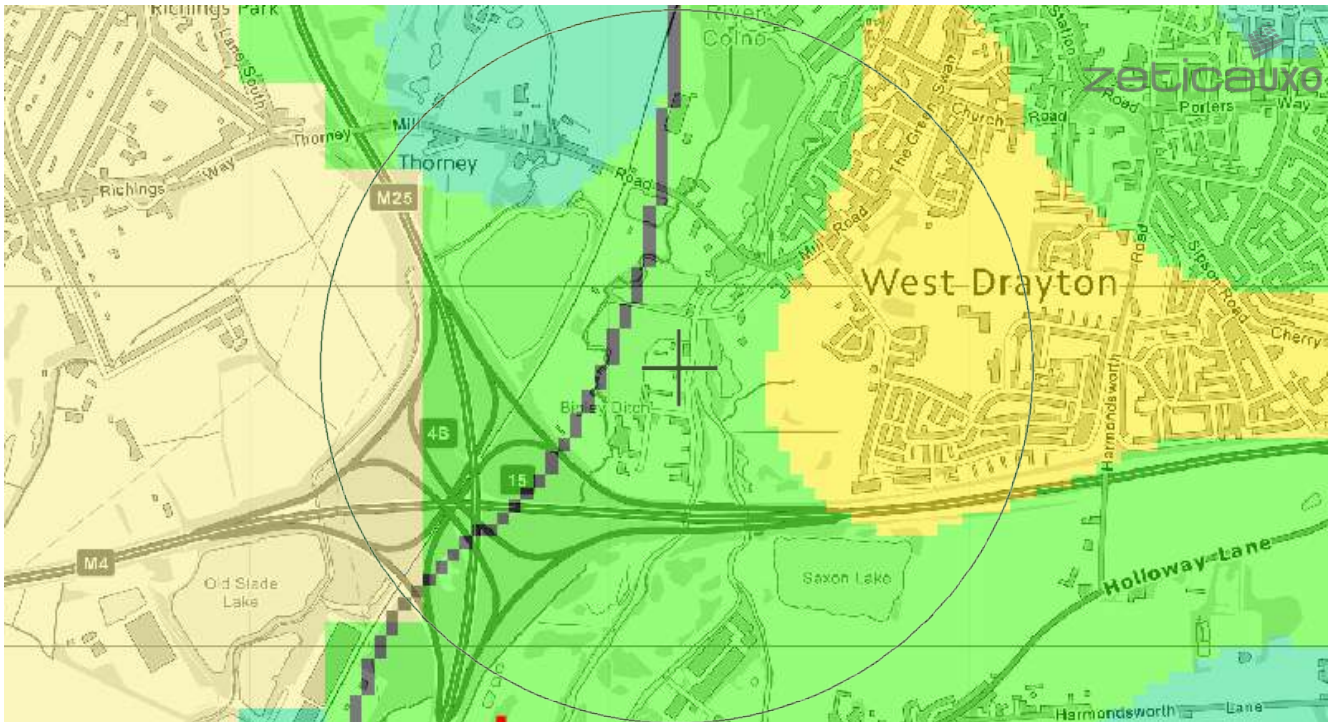

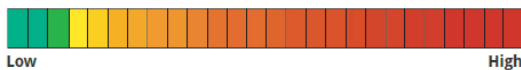

Other sources of UXO may also be indicated, although note that these are not comprehensive and more detailed research is required to confirm their presence.

## What if my Site is in a moderate or high density area?

During WWII, London was bombed more times than any other city in the UK. The bombing densities across the city are generally moderate to high in comparison to the rest of the UK.

You will receive two map downloads for sites on the boundary of London: one to demonstrate the bombing density in relation to the rest of the UK, and another to reflect the bombing density of the site in relation to the rest of London. Typically, we recommend that a detailed UXO desk study and risk assessment is commissioned for sites in London.

Additionally, if your site is in close proximity to a strategic target, military establishment, airfield or bombing decoy, then [additional detailed research](#) is recommended.

## If my site is in a low risk area, do I need to do anything?

If both the map and other research confirm that there is a low potential for UXO to be present on your site, then, subject to your own comfort and risk tolerance, works can proceed with no special precautions.

If you are unsure whether other sources of UXO may be present, you can request one of our [pre-desk study assessments \(PDSA\)](#) by emailing a site boundary and location to [pdsa@zetica.com](mailto:pdsa@zetica.com).

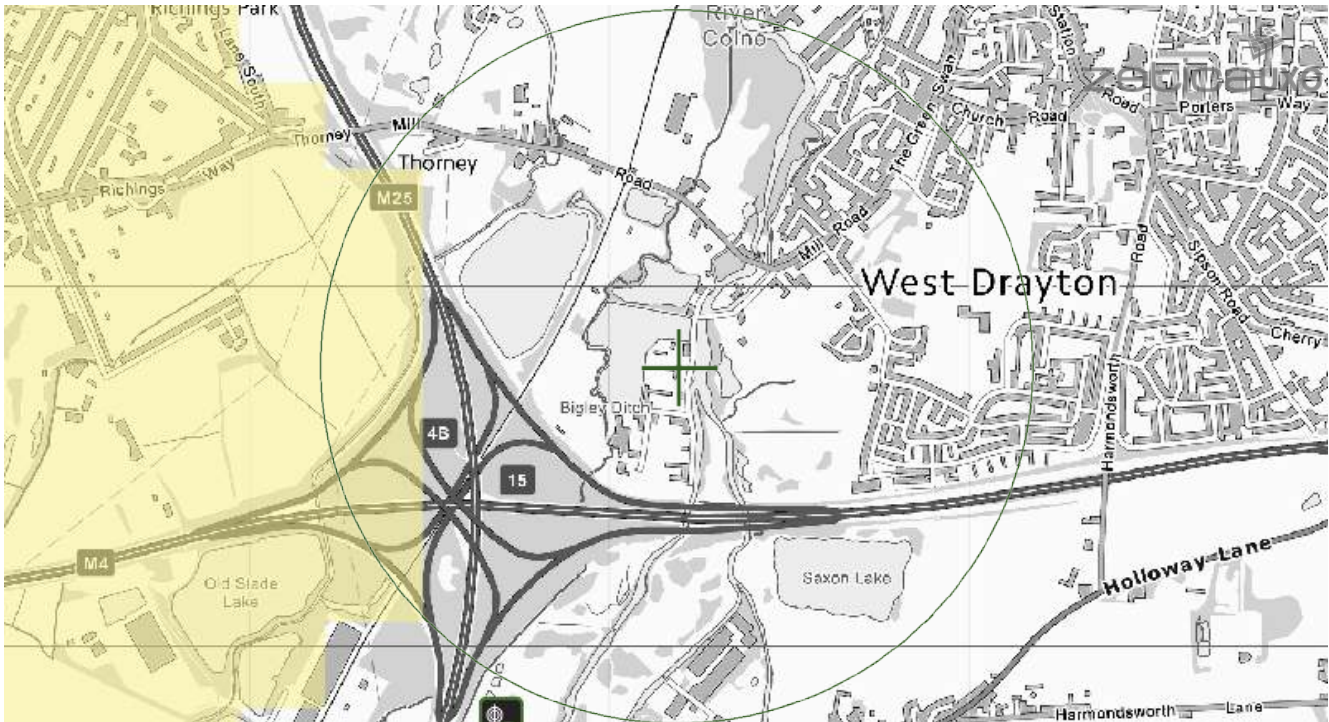
