Public Engagement

Public Exhibition Event

A public exhibition was held on Wednesday 22 February 2023 between 3pm and 7pm at Harefield Library which is located approximately 0.9 km from the application site. A summary of the responses can be found below. All concerns have been recorded and formulated into a table whereby the applicant has provided a response to each query.

Feedback from The Community

"This is a great organisation providing opportunities for all ages & abilities to experience outdoor activities on both water & land."

"Very positive. Currently this area is neglected and needs careful development. The natural resources should benefit as well as this sailing club, HOAC and all other uses."

- 1.1 An important part of the consultation process is to analyse and report back on the findings from all the comments received, in order for them to be able to be fed back into the design process and keep the Applicant's team updated on any topics or issues which may arise.
- 1.2 Those that attended the public consultation event were asked to complete a comment form to record their level of agreement or otherwise on the key aspects of the scheme, in order to obtain structured feedback.
- 1.3 When comments have been recorded on respondents' behalf, all due care has been taken to fairly represent comments and opinions, to ensure that the categorisation of answers has been carried out in a consistent and unbiased way.
- 1.4 Following the close of the consultation period, the Applicant's team analysed and discussed the comments received from the community and reported back to the project development team.

Responding to feedback

- 1.5 Throughout the consultation process, the Applicant has listened to feedback from stakeholders and local residents, and where possible has made changes to the emerging scheme design to address concerns raised.
- 1.6 The following table is a response to those concerns. Where it has been possible to make changes in order to address concerns raised through the consultation process, this is explained below.

On-site security	The access and egress point to the south of the site will be gated for both pedestrian and vehicular access. The gates will be closed and secured throughout the day and night. The gates will be automatically controlled.		
Speed control along Canal Bridge	The existing bridge over the Grand Union Canal will be upgraded and used for routing utility services only. The bridge will not be accessible for pedestrians and vehicles.		
Disabled parking	Eight disabled parking spaces (cars and minibus) will be provided at the site.		
Memberships for the public	The activity centre will operate on a membership basis, either annual memberships or on a per-day basis. Affordable membership options were available for families to allow them to participate regularly.		
Impact on the environment and SSSI allocation	Habitat creation and enhancement is at the focus of the planning application given the sensitive location. An Ecological Mitigation Plan is included as part of the submission which explains how the development will be delivered whilst responding directly to the environmental constraints posed by the Site.		
Management of Broadwater Sailing Club	The Broadwater Sailing Club (BSC) is to be relocated from the northern part of the site to the new site at the south of the site. BSC will be co-located with the HWSFAC, within a new, purpose-built facility, where it will become a lessee of the Council. The facilities at the current BSC will be replaced in its proposed location. The BSC will use the same access as the HWSFAC which is located to the south of the site, off Moorhall Road. Further details of when the BSC will predominately operate can be found in the Parking Design and Management Plan, prepared by Robert West, enclosed as part of the submission.		
Waste management	Adequate facilities will be provided for operational and construction related waste, including segregated bins for refuse and recycling.		
Dredging of the lake to maintain 2m depth	The dredging of the lake has taken into consideration the fluctuations over summer to ensure the 2m depth is maintained. The dredging will allow all uses to operate on the lake.		

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The impact of operational noise from HS2	The Noise Assessment enclosed as part of the submission takes into consideration the existing noise sensitive receptors and the potential impact of operational HS2 on the residential aspects on the proposed development. It is understood that wayside noise barriers have been proposed as part of the HS2's noise strategy and have been designed to ensure that they do not generate any new potentially significant noise impacts impact compared to those advised in HS2's Environmental Statement.
